Cooking up good korma: Indian restaurant celebrates cookbook launch

EMC News - Five years ago, Brockville author and teacher Crystle Mazurek had the idea to immortalize and share the recipes from her favourite restaurant, Curry Original, with members of the public by writing a cookbook in celebration of the Kingston landmark. On Oct. 17, her dream officially became reality when the Curry Original Cookbook was launched at the downtown restaurant.

Opened by brothers Ali and Weais Afzal in 1985, Curry Original prides itself in serving authentic Indian cuisine to local diners.

"I've been coming to Ali and Weais' restaurant for many, many years, and always found it to be the best Indian food in Canada," says Mazurek.

That's high praise coming from a woman who was raised in India and travels back to the country each year to perform work for her charity, the India Village Poverty Relief Fund.

Specifically, it was a love for the dish lamb dhansak that inspired Mazurek to write the book.

"I love to cook, and for years I kept trying to make this lamb dhansak that I would always order here," she says. "I could not figure out what was in the sauce and I thought, well, if I can write the cookbook I can get the recipe to lamb dhansak. So then I approached Ali and that's how we got started."

Ali notes that the idea of compiling all their recipes had never occurred to them

"We have a traditional way of cooking where people learn from the kitchen, so we never thought of a book," he says. "But [Crystle had] been telling me for a long time, 'let's do it, let's do it.' She took the time and found the publisher. It was quite easy for us except the head chef and my brother [who developed a lot of the recipes] had to sit down with

"For me it was nothing," he jokes. "I always tell my friends, 'if I cook - run from the restaurant."

Mazurek explains that the process of writing the cookbook was quite enjoyable.

"First I came and transcribed [the recipes] onto paper with the chef," she says. "Then we would go into the kitchen and start testing them all, making sure that what we had written down matches what really happens when they put the recipe together."

Next, Mazurek tested them out a second time at home, making her the most popular woman in the neighbourhood.

"That was lots of fun," she says. "My friends in particular enjoyed having so much Indian food all the time. I would post on Facebook "samosas today" [etc.] and they'd all come running."

Finally, she gave the recipes to a colleague, Paris-trained chef Penny Jenkinson, for another round of testing.

"They've been tested three times and some changes were made along the way," she says. "Then my son, Aaron, did all of the photography for it and it went off to the publisher."

Relevant bits of cultural trivia are interspersed throughout each of the book's sections.


"That just rounds it out a bit, and makes it more interesting," notes Mazurek.


